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#### INTRODUCTION

The 2019 Missouri Statewide Homelessness Study provides a summary of information available about homelessness in each Missouri Continuum of Care (CoC) region and across the state for the 2014-2018 time period. Utilizing data from each CoC's Point-in-Time (PIT) Count, Housing Inventory Count (HIC), Annual Homeless Assessment Report (AHAR), system performance measure data, and local coordinated entry systems (CES), this report reviews the state of homelessness in Missouri through the lens of data and offers an opportunity to reflect on trends across the state and within each CoC. This report provides information covering trends in:

- How many people are experiencing homelessness, including both sheltered and unsheltered populations;
- Who is experiencing homelessness, including the racial composition of those experiencing homelessness, numbers of families, unaccompanied youth, and veterans experiencing homelessness, and other specific subpopulations;
- The state's homeless housing capacity, including for emergency shelter, transitional housing, and permanent housing; and
- Progress made in responding to homelessness measured using system performance measures defined by the U.S.
   Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), including how the state and communities compare related to percentages of households served who return to homelessness after being housed, median length of time homeless, housing access and retention, and progress toward ending homelessness for specific subpopulations.

The Missouri Housing Development Commission (MHDC) contracted with Homebase to conduct this Study and produce this report. Homebase's methodology for completing the study began with collecting data from the HUD Homelessness Data Exchange (HDX) database and from CoC staff. In addition, Homebase interviewed the program and HMIS administrators for each CoC in Missouri to offer additional context about the CoC, its data and how its homelessness system has developed in recent years. Homebase analyzed the available information and prepared this report. This report closes out the past decade of biennial reports published by MHDC. Previous reports were published in 2017, 2015, 2013, and 2011.

#### **HOW TO USE THIS STUDY**

The 2019 Missouri Homelessness Study is meant to provide both high-level and detailed information about homelessness statewide and in each CoC. The first part of the Study is a series of fact sheets, one for the state of Missouri and one for each CoC, providing high-level data about the number of people experiencing homelessness, homeless subpopulations, housing capacity, coordinated entry system performance, and homeless system performance, including changes over the past five years. This information provides the reader with a set of key takeaways on the number and demographics of those experiencing homelessness in the state and each CoC, as well as relative success in responding to homelessness.

The second part of the study is a set of comprehensive data charts and tables about homelessness for each CoC and the state for the 2014-2018 time period. This data will provide the reader with easy access to a thorough set of data from the PIT, HIC, and AHAR sources.

The goal of the 2019 Missouri Homelessness Study is to offer those within the homelessness field in Missouri an opportunity to review available data across the state's homeless systems of care, assess the progress made toward ending homelessness, and identify opportunities towards ending and reducing homelessness.



# 2019 Missouri Statewide Homeless Study Fact Sheet Glossary

This Fact Sheet Glossary offers background information on the data sources for each section of the Fact Sheets. It also provides additional context and caveats that the reader may consider as they review the Fact Sheets. Please note that the majority of the data is HUD required and follows HUD guidelines. CoCs provided local Coordinated Entry System (CES) data. Each CoC's CES is designed to meet local needs and there may be differences in how data points are measured.

#### 2014-2018 Point-in-Time Count: How many are experiencing homelessness

The 2014-2018 Point-in-Time (PIT) count data was collected from the HUD Homelessness Data Exchange (HDX) for each CoC. The state data reflects the summation of the data of each CoC for each year from 2014 through 2018. This data reflects the information submitted to HUD for the PIT Count for sheltered and unsheltered populations.

HUD requires that each CoC conduct a sheltered count every year and an unsheltered count every other year (odd years). Almost every CoC in Missouri conducts sheltered and unsheltered counts every year. The one exception is the City of St. Louis, which in 2014 only conducted a sheltered PIT count. In the following years, the City of St. Louis conducted both a sheltered and unsheltered count each year.

The PIT count has limitations in its ability to give an accurate count of how many people are experiencing homelessness in a community in a given year. The count typically takes place over a period of 1-2 days in January, and only provides a snapshot of how many people are experiencing homelessness at that particular point in time. The PIT count is a barometer of overall trends and significant changes.

#### 2014-2018 Subpopulation Trends: Who is experiencing homelessness

#### **Families**

Family homelessness data was collected from the HUD reported PIT count.

#### **Unaccompanied Youth**

Unaccompanied youth homelessness data was collected from the HUD reported PIT count.

Data was unavailable for 2014, so this information only covers 2015-2018 for each CoC and the state.

Youth are a particularly difficult population to count especially without targeted engagement.

#### Race

Race data for those experiencing homelessness was collected from the HUD reported PIT count. Data for racial groups is displayed based on highest percentages, so each CoC does not include the same categories.

In addition, 2018 Census data was used to compare the percentage of Black or African Americans experiencing homelessness with their percentage of the general population.

#### **Domestic Violence**

Data on those experiencing domestic violence and homelessness was collected from the HUD reported PIT count.

It is important to note that experience of domestic violence often goes underreported so the number experiencing domestic violence is likely higher than reflected in this count

#### **Veterans**

Veterans homelessness data was collected from the HUD reported PIT count.

#### **Chronic Homelessness**

Chronic homelessness data was collected from the HUD reported PIT count.

In 2016, the definition of Chronic Homelessness changed. This change went into effect during the 2017 counts and for many CoCs, the change corresponds with an increase in the number of people experiencing chronic homelessness.

Homeless housing capacity data (as measured by the number of beds reported in the Housing Inventory Count, HIC) was collected through the HUD-reported HIC that each CoC completes annually. The state data is a summation of the CoC-level data.

Not all CoCs invest in the same types of homelessness housing. For example, Safe Haven housing and Other (meaning types of permanent housing not included in another category) are two types of housing not available in all CoCs. Where data reflected no units of a particular housing type, that category of housing was not included in the CoC's Fact Sheet.

#### **System Performance & Progress Toward Ending Homelessness**

The system performance measure (SPM) data highlighted in the Fact Sheets was collected from HUD's System Performance Measure Summary for 2015-2017 and the CoC's HDX report for 2018. For each data point, the State Fact Sheet is an average of all CoCs data. This information provides an overview of how a CoC's system is performing according to the HUD defined SPMs. SPM data is available for 2015-2018. In some cases CoCs did not have data available for particular years. When a fact sheet does not include a data point, the CoC did not have data for that year.

#### **Median Length of Time Homeless**

SPM 1 measures median and average length of time homeless for each CoC, assessing the number of days a participant is enrolled in an Emergency Shelter, Safe Haven or Transitional Housing program. This data was collected from data reported to HUD and included in HDX SPM reports.

The measure used in the Fact Sheets is the median length of time homeless. Median number of days was chosen over average to avoid any outlier data that may skew the number high or low.

#### **Returns to Homelessness**

SPM 2 measures the rate of returns from permanent housing destinations to homelessness. This measure looks at clients in each CoC who exited to a permanent destination but have since returned to homelessness as indicated by a more recent record in Street Outreach, Emergency Shelter, Safe Haven, and Transitional Housing interventions. This data was collected from data reported to HUD and included in HDX SPM reports.

In addition to the percent returns by housing intervention, the Fact Sheets also provide an average for how many individuals served through the CoC homelessness system return to homelessness within 2 years from permanent housing destinations.

#### **Exits to Permanent Housing**

SPM 7 measures the percent of those in a CoC's homeless system of care who are in permanent supportive housing and retain permanent housing or exit to other permanent housing.

The measure also looks at the percent of people who successfully exited to permanent housing from emergency shelter, transitional housing, safe haven, or rapid re-housing.

The Fact Sheets include both percentages. This data was collected from data reported to HUD and included in HDX SPM reports.

#### **Coordinated Entry System Data**

Coordinated Entry System (CES) data was provide by the CoC collaborative applicants and HMIS administrators. For data sources see each Fact Sheet. Statewide totals are unavailable. Each CoC currently has different date ranges and slightly different data collection for CES. While this report does not include state information, future reports may provide this information as HUD releases additional CES guidance and helps standardized data collection and analysis of CES data.

#### **Progress Toward Ending Homelessness**


Progress toward ending homelessness is measured by looking at the U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH) list of "Communities that have ended homelessness." This information is available online at USICH's website.

PIT count subpopulation decreases were also referenced when appropriate.

# Missouri Statewide Overview 2019 Homelessness Study Fact Sheet

This fact sheet provides an overview of homelessness data across the entire state of Missouri. It reflects the cumulative data from all CoCs across Missouri between 2014 through 2018, and provides a picture of statewide performance and progress toward ending homelessness. This overview may also provide CoCs within the state a point of comparison for their performance. It's important to note that this data reflects the data recorded within all the CoCs across Missouri and reflects individual CoC data challenges and varying PIT count methodologies. The statewide data can offer insight into larger trends and performance across the state and serve as a reference point for the system going forward.

#### 2014-2018 Point-in-Time Count: How many are experiencing homelessness



Between 2014 and 2018 overall homelessness in Missouri decreased 18% from 7,186 to 5,883. During this same period, the state overall experienced a:


- 26% decrease in sheltered homelessness (6,309 to 4,669)
- 38% increase in unsheltered homelessness (877 to 1,214)

#### As of 2018:

- 79% of people experiencing homelessness are sheltered in the state
- 21% of people experiencing homelessness are unsheltered in the state




#### **Unaccompanied Youth**



Chronic homelessness increased 8%. This increase is impacted by a change between 2016 and 2017 in how chronic homelessness was defined and counted



- Increased 5.5% for Permanent Supportive Housing






#### **System Performance & Progress Toward Ending Homelessness**

System performance measure data from 2015-2018 highlights strengths and weaknesses of the homeless system of care. Statewide, from 2015-2018, the average median length of time homeless was 41.5 days; 6% of people returned to homelessness within two years; and, 89% of people in permanent housing retained or exited to other permanent housing.

#### **Median Length of Time Homeless**

Between 2015-2018, the average median length of time homeless was 42.7 days. This measure assesses the median number of days a participant is enrolled in an Emergency Shelter, Safe Haven or Transitional Housing program.





#### **Exits to Permanent Housing**

On average, 92% of people in permanent housing retained or exited to permanent housing (2015-2018). 45% of people exited to permanent housing from emergency shelter, transitional housing, safe haven or rapid re-housing over this same period.



# MO-500 St. Louis County CoC 2019 Homelessness Study Fact Sheet

The St. Louis County Continuum of Care (CoC) covers the St. Louis County area and the County Government is the Collaborative Applicant. St. Louis County is unique in its proximity to the City of St. Louis, which provides opportunities for collaboration and coordination. The County's geography covers the areas north, west, and south of the City. The St. Louis County and City CoCs share a Coordinated Entry System (CES) and host joint meetings that bring their CoC Boards together to work more effectively and efficiently to end homelessness in the region.

#### 2014-2018 Point-in-Time Count: How many are experiencing homelessness



Between 2014 and 2018 the CoC experienced a 12% increase in overall homelessness from 402 to 450. During this same period, the CoC experienced a:

- 22% increase in sheltered homelessness (347 to 424)
- 53% decrease in unsheltered homelessness (55 to 26)











# MO-501 St. Louis City CoC 2019 Homelessness Study Fact Sheet

The City of St. Louis Continuum of Care (CoC) covers the geography of the City of St. Louis. The City also serves as the Collaborative Applicant. Close in geographic proximity, the City of St. Louis CoC shares a Coordinated Entry System (CES) with the St. Louis County CoC. This collaborative effort has led to additional coordination to address the issue of homelessness across the region.

#### 2014-2018 Point-in-Time Count: How many are experiencing homelessness



Between 2014 and 2018 the CoC experienced almost a 25% decrease in overall homelessness from 1,258 to 949. During this same period, the CoC experienced a:

- 32% decrease in sheltered homelessness (1,258 to 852)
- 13% decrease in unsheltered homeless (112 to 97) from 2015-2018\*







# MO-503 St. Charles, Warren & Lincoln Counties CoC 2019 Homelessness Study Fact Sheet

The counties of St. Charles, Warren and Lincoln form the "Tri-County" Continuum of Care (CoC) with Community Council of St. Charles County serving as the Collaborative Applicant. Over the past few years, the CoC has made strides in improving data quality and timely data entry. As part of the CoC's coordinated entry system (CES) implementation they are working to coordinate with bordering counties to track clients as they move throughout the area. There is an emphasis on increased collaboration and taking a more regional approach to ending homelessness across the Tri-County CoC.

#### 2014-2018 Point-in-Time Count: How many are experiencing homelessness



Between 2014 and 2018 the CoC experienced a 41% decrease in overall homelessness from 896 to 532. During this same period, the CoC also experienced a:

- 40% decrease in sheltered homelessness (614 to 370)
- 43% decrease in unsheltered homelessness (282 to 162)





# MO-600 Springfield-Greene, Christian & Webster CoC 2019 Homelessness Study Fact Sheet

The City of Springfield and the counties of Greene, Christian, and Webster comprise one of the Continuum of Care (CoC) in the southwest corner of Missouri. The City of Springfield is the lead agency for the CoC and has led this work since the CoC was created in 1995. The CoC is a mix of rural and urban areas. It includes the urban area of Springfield while also extending out to rural areas. The CoC underwent a data migration of their HMIS to a new system over 2016 and 2017. In 2017, the CoC also formally launched their Coordinated Entry System (CES) that is also now integrated into their HMIS.




















Figure 000-2. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS (IN FAMILIES) EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY SHELTER STATUS, 2014-2018




Figure 000-3. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY GENDER, 2014-2018









Figure 000-4. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY RACE, 2014-2018




















Figure 000-25. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 4: AVERAGE PERCENTAGE OF LEAVERS THAT INCREASED




Figure 000-26. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 5: AVERAGE TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS ENTERING EMERGENCY SHELTERS, SAFE HAVENS, TRANSITIONAL HOUSING, OR PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FOR THE FIRST TIME ACROSS ALL COCS, 2015-2018




Figure 000-27. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 7: AVERAGE CHANGE IN SUCCESSFUL OUTCOMES ACROSS ALL COCS, 2015-2018




Figure 500-2. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS (IN FAMILIES) EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY SHELTER STATUS, 2014-2018 209 Total 208 219-192 Sheltered 208 205 174-Unsheltered 41 45-0 2014 2015 2016 2017 2018






Figure 500-4. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY RACE, 2014-2018





Figure 500-5. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY ETHNICITY, 2014-2018









Figure 500-23. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 2: RETURNS TO HOMELESSNESS BY TYPE OF EXIT, 2015-2018 Exit from Emergency Shelter 6% Permanent Supportive Safe Haven Street Outreach 2% 5% Transitional Housing 4% 2% 4% 4% 3% 3% 1%






Figure 500-26. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 5: TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS ENTERING EMERGENCY SHELTERS, SAFE HAVENS, TRANSITIONAL HOUSING, OR PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FOR THE FIRST TIME, 2015-2018









Figure 501-4. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY RACE, 2014-2018










Figure 501-13. TOTAL NUMBER OF SHELTERED PERSONS (SINGLE INDIVIDUALS) BY TYPE OF HOUSING, 2014-2017




Figure 501-22. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 1: MEDIAN NUMBER OF BED NIGHTS IN EMERGENCY SHELTER, SAFE HAVENS, AND TRANSITIONAL HOUSING, 2015-2018




Figure 501-26. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 5: TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS ENTERING EMERGENCY SHELTERS, SAFE HAVENS, TRANSITIONAL HOUSING, OR PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FOR THE FIRST TIME, 2015-2018





Figure 501-27. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 7: CHANGE IN SUCCESSFUL OUTCOMES, 2015-2018




Figure 503-2. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS (IN FAMILIES) EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY SHELTER STATUS, 2014-2018





Figure 503-3. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY GENDER, 2014-2018












Figure 503-5. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY ETHNICITY, 2014-2018 Non-Hispanic/Non-Latino Hispanic/Latino










Figure 503-23. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 2: RETURNS TO HOMELESSNESS BY TYPE OF EXIT, 2015-2018 Exit from Emergency Shelter Permanent Supportive 8% Safe Haven Street Outreach <1% 20% 7% Transitional Housing 11% 2% 2% 4% 3%




Figure 503-26. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 5: TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS ENTERING EMERGENCY SHELTERS, SAFE HAVENS, TRANSITIONAL HOUSING, OR PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FOR THE FIRST TIME, 2015-2018




Figure 503-27. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 7: CHANGE IN SUCCESSFUL OUTCOMES, 2015-2018 **2015 2016** 2017 **2018** 94% 100% 100% 96% 87% 66% 56% 50% 49% 43% 16% Successful ES, TH, SH, PH-RRH Exit Successful PH Retention or Exit Successful Street Outreach Outcome






Figure 600-2. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS (IN FAMILIES) EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY SHELTER STATUS, 2014-2018





Figure 600-3. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY GENDER, 2014-2018












Figure 600-13. TOTAL NUMBER OF SHELTERED PERSONS (SINGLE INDIVIDUALS) BY TYPE OF HOUSING, 2014-2017





Figure 600-23. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 2: RETURNS TO HOMELESSNESS BY TYPE OF EXIT, 2015-2018 Exit from






Figure 600-25. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 4: PERCENTAGE OF LEAVERS THAT INCREASED INCOME BY TYPE OF INCOME, 2015-2018




Figure 600-26. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 5: TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS ENTERING EMERGENCY SHELTERS, SAFE HAVENS, TRANSITIONAL HOUSING, OR PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FOR THE FIRST TIME, 2015-2018




Figure 600-27. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 7: CHANGE IN SUCCESSFUL OUTCOMES, 2015-2018


Figure 602-1. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY SHELTER STATUS, 2014-2018


















Figure 602-23. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 2: RETURNS TO HOMELESSNESS BY TYPE OF EXIT, 2015-2018






Figure 602-25. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 4: PERCENTAGE OF LEAVERS THAT INCREASED INCOME BY TYPE OF INCOME, 2015-2018




Figure 602-26. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 5: TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS ENTERING EMERGENCY SHELTERS, SAFE HAVENS, TRANSITIONAL HOUSING, OR PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FOR THE FIRST TIME, 2015-2018




Figure 602-27. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 7: CHANGE IN SUCCESSFUL OUTCOMES, 2015-2018











Figure 603-4. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY RACE, 2014-2018







Figure 603-23. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 2: RETURNS TO HOMELESSNESS BY TYPE OF EXIT, 2015-2018




Figure 603-26. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 5: TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS ENTERING EMERGENCY SHELTERS, SAFE HAVENS, TRANSITIONAL HOUSING, OR PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FOR THE FIRST TIME, 2015-2018




Figure 603-27. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 7: CHANGE IN SUCCESSFUL OUTCOMES, 2015-2018





Figure 604-2. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS (IN FAMILIES) EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY SHELTER STATUS, 2014-2018 544 Total Sheltered Unsheltered 21-











Figure 604-5. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY ETHNICITY, 2014-2018 **2015 2016 2014** 2017 **2018** 1,766 1,557 1,360 1,355 1,350 165 127 102 92 Non-Hispanic/Non-Latino Hispanic/Latino














Figure 604-26. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 5: TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS ENTERING EMERGENCY SHELTERS, SAFE HAVENS, TRANSITIONAL HOUSING, OR PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FOR THE FIRST TIME, 2015-2018




Figure 606-2. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS (IN FAMILIES) EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY SHELTER STATUS, 2014-2018






Figure 606-3. TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS BY GENDER, 2014-2018
























Figure 606-23. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 2: RETURNS TO HOMELESSNESS BY TYPE OF EXIT, 2015-2018






Figure 600-25. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 4: PERCENTAGE OF LEAVERS THAT INCREASED INCOME BY TYPE OF INCOME, 2015-2018




Figure 606-26. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 5: TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONS ENTERING EMERGENCY SHELTERS, SAFE HAVENS, TRANSITIONAL HOUSING, OR PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FOR THE FIRST TIME, 2015-2018




Figure 606-27. SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURE 7: CHANGE IN SUCCESSFUL OUTCOMES, 2015-2018 **2016 2015 2017 2018** 96% 92% 90% 93% 91% 64% 61% 47% 51% 55% 54% 40% Successful ES, TH, SH, PH-RRH Exit Successful PH Retention or Exit Successful Street Outreach Outcome
