# **OVERVIEW**

## **INTRODUCTION**

Each year, nonprofit agencies, businesses and volunteers conduct a Point In Time Count (PITC) of the homeless sheltered and unsheltered individuals in the state of Missouri. These participants canvas the state conducting surveys and face-to-face interviews. They also rely on database reports to determine how many homeless individuals live in the state at a specific point in time.

The PITC is mandated to be done every other year by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). During the January 2007 count, Missouri reported 5,264 homeless individuals. Of these individuals, 1,106 were unsheltered and 4,158 were staying in emergency or transitional shelters. Thirty-five of the 5,264 individuals were unaccompanied youth, 1,122 were chronically homeless and 418 were veterans.<sup>1</sup>

## **PURPOSE**

In an effort to provide a statewide view of homelessness, this study details regional information such as PITC information, demographic information and emergency or transitional facility information. This study is a user-friendly tool to inform the public of homeless issues. In addition, information on homeless veterans, students and ex-offenders is included.

## **PROCESS**

In Missouri, there are eight Continua of Care (CoC), and each have data-tracking systems and methods for reporting homelessness. To attain consistency and accuracy, this study uses data submitted in each continuum's yearly application for HUD-funded housing programs. The application details each region's homeless count and breaks down the information into the following categories: unsheltered homeless, emergency shelter and transitional housing programs. Additionally, this study breaks down the sub-populations within the count, including unaccompanied minors, chronically homeless individuals, veterans, victims of domestic violence and HIV/AIDS, and those dealing with substance abuse and mental illness.

The other main source of information specific to Missouri homelessness is obtained from each continuum's database, using the HUD-approved Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). Information gathered in the emergency shelters, transitional shelters, permanent housing and Shelter Plus Care programs reflects the number of individuals served in 2006 and 2007. It is important to note that the numbers included in this study only reflect data from the agencies reporting into each continuum system. Although agencies that do not receive state or federal dollars may choose to input data into their local HMIS, they are not required to do so. The use of the Continuum of Care application information and the HMIS data to generate this report is based on the understanding that both of these sources give the most accurate description of the homeless individuals being served in the state. Furthermore, since each agency entering into an HMIS reports every individual served, the possibility of the utilization of service in multiple regions and/or progression through the continuum of programs may result in duplication of those reported.

# **DEMOGRAPHIC DEFINITIONS**

**Homeless Individual\*:** As defined by HUD, a homeless individual is a person who is living on the street or in an emergency shelter, or who would be living on the street or in an emergency shelter without HUD's homelessness assistance. A person is considered homeless only when he/she resides in one of the following places: places not meant for human habitation, such as cars, parks, sidewalks, abandoned buildings, on the street; in an emergency shelter; in transitional or supportive housing for homeless persons who originally came from the streets or emergency shelters.

**Chronic Homelessness:** An unaccompanied homeless individual with a disabling condition who has been either continuously homeless for a year or more OR has had at least four episodes of homelessness in the past three years is considered chronically homeless. To be considered chronically homeless, a person must have been sleeping in a place not meant for human habitation and/or in emergency shelter during that time.

**Disabling Condition:** A disabling condition is a diagnosable substance abuse disorder, serious mental illness, developmental disability, or chronic physical illness or disability. A disabling condition may include the co-occurrence of two or more of these conditions.

**Homeless Management Information System (HMIS):** HMIS is a computerized data collection application designed to capture client-level information over time on the characteristics and service needs of men, women and children experiencing homelessness, while also protecting client confidentiality. It is designed to aggregate client-level data to generate an unduplicated count of clients served within a community's system of homeless services. HMIS may also cover a statewide or regional area, and may include several CoCs. The HMIS can provide data on client characteristics and service utilization.

**Emergency Shelter:** This is any facility with overnight sleeping accommodations, the primary purpose of which is to provide temporary shelter for homeless individuals or families. The length of stay can range from one night to three months.

**Balance of State (BoS):** Balance of State (BoS) refers to the CoC that includes the 101 counties that are not covered under the other continua, which are the urban, larger metro areas. However, the BoS can still include some or all of the state's smaller cities. The goal of the BoS is to promote planning and collaboration in its counties to make funds available to the areas that are not covered by other continua. The BoS addresses the need for services in non-metropolitan areas where resources are often scarce.

# *PITC OVERVIEW AND DATA*

## *Point In Time Counts:*

“HUD requires CoCs [Continua of Care] to conduct a Point In Time Count at least every two years during the last 10 days of January, and requests that CoCs conduct a count annually if resources allow.”<sup>1</sup> The Point In Time Count is performed to capture “statistically reliable, unduplicated counts or estimates of homeless persons in sheltered and unsheltered locations on a single night.”<sup>1</sup> For the past two years, all continua in the state of Missouri have made efforts to perform the required count on the same day.

In order to collect unsheltered data, “CoCs are instructed to count all adults, children and unaccompanied youth sleeping in places not meant for human habitation.”<sup>2</sup> Surveys are administered to individuals and families on the street and at social service locations in each county. There are three ways in which to collect data during the count: a simple street count with observation in which the survey is completed by only observing the individual; the street count with interview where the individual is interviewed and the survey is completed based on the answers; and the service-based count where interviews are conducted at the non-shelter service locations that unsheltered homeless people rely on to survive, such as soup kitchens, drop-in centers, healthcare centers and emergency rooms. During the interview, individuals are asked “Where were you sleeping last night?” in an attempt to capture the number of unsheltered homeless individuals that were not interviewed on the actual date of the count.<sup>3</sup>

In order to collect sheltered data, “CoCs are instructed to count all adults, children, and unaccompanied youth residing in emergency shelters and transitional housing, including domestic violence shelters, residential programs for runaway/homeless youth and any hotel/motel/apartment voucher arrangements paid by a public/private agency because the person is homeless.”<sup>2</sup> Sheltered data is collected through each CoC’s HMIS along with surveying agencies that do not enter into an HMIS, but are providing shelter.<sup>4</sup>




### Missouri Continua of Care Regions


### Winter 2008 PITC - Sheltered and Unsheltered

### Winter 2008 PITC - Unsheltered






# HMIS DATA

### 2007 NUMBER OF HOMELESS SERVED REPORT





**2007 NUMBER OF HOMELESS SERVED REPORT - EMERGENCY SHELTER**



**2007 NUMBER OF HOMELESS SERVED REPORT - TRANSITIONAL HOUSING**



**2007 NUMBER OF HOMELESS SERVED REPORT - PERMANENT HOUSING**



**2007 NUMBER OF HOMELESS SERVED REPORT - SHELTER PLUS CARE**









### 2007 AGE REPORT - EMERGENCY SHELTER






### 2007 AGE REPORT - PERMANENT HOUSING

### 2007 AGE REPORT - SHELTER PLUS CARE



**2007 PRIOR LIVING SITUATION REPORT**



### 2007 PRIOR LIVING SITUATION - EMERGENCY SHELTER



### 2007 PRIOR LIVING SITUATION - TRANSITIONAL HOUSING



### 2007 PRIOR LIVING SITUATION - PERMANENT HOUSING



### 2007 PRIOR LIVING SITUATION - SHELTER PLUS CARE








### 2007 RACE REPORT - EMERGENCY SHELTER


### 2007 RACE REPORT - TRANSITIONAL HOUSING


**2007 RACE REPORT - PERMANENT HOUSING**

# **POLICIES: VETERANS**

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) created the Health Care for Homeless Veterans (HCHV) programs to provide services to homeless veterans. The following is a brief description of each of the HCHV programs as defined by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs:<sup>1</sup>

**Health Care of Homeless Veterans (HCHV):** The HCHV program helps homeless veterans gain stability through case management services and contracted shelter. Veterans receive intensive case management including the following: in-take assessment, treatment planning, and connecting them with VA providers, employment assistance, exploring benefits, and referral to community resources.<sup>2</sup>

**Grant and Per Diem Program:** The Grant and Per Diem Program is offered to community agencies providing transitional housing or services to homeless veterans. The goal is to help homeless veterans achieve residential stability, increase their skill levels and/or income, and obtain greater self-determination.<sup>1</sup>

**Stand Downs:** Stand Downs are one- to three-day events where local VAs, government agencies and social service providers collaborate to offer services to homeless veterans. Some of these services include food, shelter, clothing, health screenings, VA and Social Security benefit counseling, and referrals to a variety of other necessary services, such as housing, employment and substance abuse treatment.<sup>1</sup>

**Compensated Work Therapy/ Transitional Residence (CWT/TR) Program:** The CWT/TR Program is designed to allow at-risk and homeless veterans to live in community-based supervised group homes while working for pay in VA's Compensated Work Therapy Program (also known as Veterans Industries). VA contracts with private industry and the public sector for work done by these veterans, who learn new job skills, relearn successful work habits and regain self-esteem.<sup>1</sup>

**Domiciliary Care for Homeless Veterans (DCHV) Program:** The DCHV program provides residential treatment to homeless veterans with health problems. The domiciliary offers outreach services and referrals, vocational rehabilitation, and post-discharge community support.<sup>1</sup>

**HUD-VASH:** The HUD-VASH Program provides permanent housing and ongoing case management treatment services for homeless veterans who would not be able to live independently without the support of case management. This is a HUD Section 8 program that allows veterans to live in veteran-selected apartment units with a “Housing Choice” voucher. These vouchers are portable so that veterans can live in communities served by their VA medical facility, where case management services can be provided.<sup>1</sup>

**Supported Housing:** The Supported Housing program provides staff that supply ongoing case management services to homeless veterans. Emphasis is placed on helping veterans locate permanent housing and provide clinical support to maintain stable housing.<sup>1</sup>

**Drop-In Centers:** Drop-In Centers provide a daytime sanctuary where homeless veterans can clean up, wash their clothes and participate in a variety of therapeutic and rehabilitative activities. Referrals for longer-term assistance are also available.<sup>1</sup>

**VBA-VHA Special Outreach and Benefits Assistance:** VHA has specialized Veterans Counselors to provide dedicated outreach, benefits counseling, referral and additional assistance to eligible veterans applying for VA benefits.<sup>1</sup>

In the state of Missouri, there are four major VA Medical Centers where homeless veterans can access services: Harry S. Truman Memorial, Kansas City VA Medical Center, John J. Pershing VA Medical Center and the St. Louis VA Medical Center. The following chart indicates the services available at each of the VA centers and their street addresses:

# *POLICIES: EDUCATION*

The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) has comprehensive programs to work with students experiencing homelessness or who are at risk for being homeless. There are two main federal funding streams for schools: The Homeless Assistance Act through McKinney-Vento and Title I through the No Child Left Behind Act. The following is a view of the two different programs:

When determining the number of homeless youth in school districts, DESE has a definition of homelessness they use that differs from the HUD definition.

The following is the definition of homelessness used by DESE:<sup>4</sup>

A. Lacks a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence; and

B. includes

- i. children and youths who are sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason; are living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative, adequate accommodations; are living in emergency or transitional shelters; are abandoned in hospitals; or are awaiting foster care placement;
- ii. children and youths who have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily-used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings (within the meaning of section 103 (a)(2)(C));
- iii. children and youths who are living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings.

The first category may include some individuals who have moved in with others, and consideration of each individual case, along with the permanency of the situation, will probably be needed in order to identify those who are homeless.

Additionally, when determining the standard of schooling or the programming that districts are going to implement, there are certain student rights that are taken into account. They are as follows<sup>3</sup>:

- Homeless children are to have equal access to public education.
- Homeless children are to be enrolled immediately in the school of their best interest, as determined by the family or the unaccompanied youth.
- Homeless children are not to be segregated in a separate school.
- Homeless students have a right to transportation to and from their school of origin.
- Homeless students are entitled to services whether or not they attend a school district that has received a McKinney-Vento sub-grant.

Each year, the state of Missouri issues a report totaling the number of homeless children in each district. The following chart is from the 2006-2007 school year report:

# *POLICIES: EX-OFFENDERS*

According to the Missouri Department of Corrections (DOC)<sup>1</sup>, 97% of offenders incarcerated in the state of Missouri will be released back to their community. DOC recognized the importance of working with offenders to help them transition to the community. As a result, they have the Missouri Re-entry Process (MRP). The MRP focuses on preparing the offender for the transition from institution to community, with the goal of reducing recidivism.

A central component of the MRP is the Transition Accountability Plan (TAP). The TAP is an individualized case-plan that focuses on three phases of the transition process: Institutional, Transition and Community.

The purpose of Phase 1 is to assess offenders for a multitude of needs and to place them in a prison where their needs can be best met.

In Phase 2, Programming and Treatment, offenders are provided services to address the needs identified during the assessment. The services include, but are not limited to, medical, mental health, sex offender treatment, substance abuse, education, and vocational training. During this phase, the offender's needs are reviewed to determine that the appropriate services are delivered in a timely manner.

In Phase 3, the Transition Phase, offenders prepare for release. Approximately six months prior to an offender's release from prison, the offender begins working with the DOC staff in preparation for release. DOC staff, the case management team and other community resource agencies work with the offender to develop the TAP. The team focuses on the needs of the offender to make the transition as easy as possible. Some of the areas of concentration include education/vocation, mental health/substance abuse, employment, housing, family issues, transportation, medical care, and obtainment of personal identification.

In Phase 4, the Community Phase, offenders participate in community services and supervision. Upon release, if the offender's sentence requires further monitoring, the offender is released for supervision to Division of Probation and Parole. These offenders must have a home plan prior to discharge. This means that they must have a stable place in which to live upon release. If the offenders do not have a home plan, whether this is due to not being in agreement with their field officer or not having a place to go upon release, he/she may be placed in a Community Release Center until an approved home plan is established.

There are two Community Release Centers (CRC) located in Missouri: Kansas City and St. Louis. The Kansas City Community Release Center (KCCRC) is a transitional facility with a capacity to hold 300 males and 50 females.

The St. Louis Community Release Center (SLCRC) has a housing capacity of 500 males and 50 female offenders. Most offenders must work to remain at the facility and adhere to a schedule of verified activities. Failure to abide by the restrictions can result in a return to confinement. During their stay, offenders are referred to the community for outpatient services.

In Phase 5, Discharge and Aftercare, Division of Probation and Parole is responsible for the implementation of the TAP and monitoring the progress of the offender's ability to transition.

When an offender is released from prison and is no longer under supervision, he/she is transported to the area of the state where he/she was convicted or, at times, an area of his/her choosing. Although the offenders are no longer being monitored, the TAP ensures that the offender can continue to receive on-going aftercare services.

The following is a table with the number of offenders that completed the CRC and the regions that they returned to after exiting the program. These numbers only identify offenders that were in the CRC. These numbers do not include offenders whose sentence expired while in confinement, or in county and city prisons.<sup>1</sup>

# CONCLUSION

In conclusion, this endeavor is to provide a statewide view of homelessness through detailing regional information from the PITC and HMIS information. In essence, the primary objective of the 2008 study is to inform and educate the public of homeless issues and to provide an all-encompassing depiction of homelessness in the state of Missouri.

Looking forward, in order to make this tool more effective and useful, it would be in the study's interest to grow this process by involving other state entities, increasing agency participation and accuracy of data input, increasing consistency of data collection, and increasing the understanding of what leads to homelessness.

The ultimate vision for including other statewide entities that are committed to addressing the issue of homelessness is to give them the opportunity to address homelessness from their perspective and to detail the services they provide, along with statistical data. This will allow for an expanded knowledge base of the service providers who are working on the issue of homelessness.

An additional and vital piece to making this tool effective is inline with the HMIS goals, which necessitates an increase in agency participation and data-quality input. Increased support of these two items combined will enhance the capability of providing better data and more encompassing results.

Furthermore, there is a strong need for an increase in the consistency of data collection across the state. The goal is for all HMISs to provide data elements, which would track data outside of those required by HUD. The goal is that all agencies track the same data. There would also need to be a designated place and time to submit data regularly to be used for future studies. This will allow for stronger, more accurate results, and provide the possibility of longitudinal data.

For the purposes of understanding homelessness in Missouri, a future goal should be that HMISs collect data that gives a depiction of the households that are in danger of becoming homeless. This would include the utilization of homeless prevention funds and community resources.

Through the efforts of countless organizations, groups, and individuals, the most current data provided gave a comprehensive look at Missouri's homeless population. The assistance of many others will be required to increase the quality and scope of future studies.

This study provides raw statistics of households experiencing homelessness, but in no way reflects the full struggle of those families. Readers should use this as a tool to educate and increase awareness of the needs in the state of Missouri.
